We have learned how to county by fives, identify nickels, and identify cylinders in math.

We crossed the Delaware with George Washington and discussed the significance of that battle. We are looking forward to celebrating Colonial Day on Thursday, March 10.

School They have begun to use pens for Language Arts, learning to organize for each class separately, and concentrating on responsibility.

Rehearsals for "Romeo and Juliet" by William Shakespeare have begun, and the children are enjoying the storyline, which has been transposed for fifth graders. We look forward to performing this at our annual Renaissance Festival in late spring.

In science we are completing our unit on the Elements and matter, and will begin the final units on animals, then on to the Human Body and its systems.

In English we are beginning to practice identifying analogies, and we are using context clues to identify new words.

We are also enjoying the warmer weather, but remember some of the days are cool in the morning, so try to help

students remember their Angelus Academy sweaters.

We are also working on proofreading our writing very carefully by using dictionaries when needed.

We are preparing for Lent by discussing what we can do extra as well as giving up something during the forty day period. In 7th grade science, we started a unit about DNA, mitosis, meosis, and DNA synthesis.

Social Studies with Mr. Hoenscheid: Our trip to Richmond was postponed last week due to the icy

morning. We are looking into April for an alternate date. This week we completed our unit on the "Fabulous Fifties"

with a Jeopardy contest and a chapter test. Next week 8th grade students will be writing and presenting papers on noted persons from the Civil Rights Era.

**Spanish with Mr. Hoenscheid**: As the season changes, so does the Spanish topic. We are looking at Spanish vocabulary

regarding the calendar, the month, the days of the week and the weather (el calendario, los meses, los dias de la semana y el tiempo).

For grades K-2, this is mostly a new topic, for grades 3-4, it is a review of last year's material, with slightly more difficult work.
