This week we also went on a field trip to see Freedom Train at George Mason. This was the story of Harriet Tubman and her involvement in the Underground Railroad. You should be proud of your student. We had some amazing young ladies and gentlemen show other students the correct way to behave. They represented our school well.

We continue learning about forgiveness and we are starting to work our way into the days before Christ was crucified. This is the most important part of our religion course this year as it teaches us all about Holy Communion. We will spend many hours on this in the next 5 weeks.

with a portion of "Black Beauty" and of course Lewis Carroll's "Alice in Wonderland". The students have identified the difference between realism and fantasy, and are enjoying the fun poems "Father William" and "Jabberwocky".

We have begun a new history unit on the Early Explorers of North America. We are mapping geographically the paths of Christopher Columbus and Juan Ponce de Leon. We have discussed why were the Spaniards interested in exploring the New World? They wanted a short cut to the East, and they wanted to spread the Faith.

Our religion discussions have taken us through the handing of the keys from Jesus to Peter. We have learned about the great gift that Our Lord left us in His Church, which isn't a building, but its people, to include ourselves. We have identified the path of authority that flows from the Pope, to the bishops, and down to the priests, right to our own home the domestic church. We have discussed how wonderful it is that we have the authority of the Pope, so we are not vulnerable to individual interpretation of scripture.

Our science for the rest of the year will focus on the human body. We are starting with the skeletal system and the students have learned that there are 300 bones in a baby while adults have around 206. We have talked about the make up of each bone, and learned the strongest bone in the body is the femur.

In math we continue to drill skip counting facts---multiplication and division. Congratulations to our Third Grade representatives to the Spelling Bee: Jacob Hurley and Patrick Wood.



The 4th grade class had been blessed with the varied

events and activities this week. First, we had a field trip to Wegman's in Fairfax. We learned how to "eat well and live well." The coordinators taught us about the different food groups and amount of daily servings for a well-balanced diet. What a great way to start off our new science unit on the Digestive system! Plus, we get to sample some food products and take home goodie bags. We were fortunate to have also observed Ash Wednesday and Mass. We started using our little purple booklets during religion class and reflect on how we can be closer to God and make our prayer time more meaningful. Another highlight our class enjoyed was the Colonial Lunch we shared with the first grade class. Many thanks to Mrs. McCrumb for inviting us to the feast and to all our 1st grade and 4th grade parents for their time and contribution. Our 4th graders were also thrilled to dress-up and perform a Read-Aloud entitled "The Declaration of Independence." We were joined by our friends from the Co-op and we hope they were entertained by our performance.

In reading, we are in the final chapters of <u>Treasure Island</u>. The next book we will read is <u>Johnny Tremain</u> by Esther Forbes. In grammar we reviewed our Irregular verbs. We started Wordly Wise this week since we completed our Spelling Bee list of words. We were proud to be represented by Caitlin Nalda and Carolyn Young in our school's first held Spelling Bee. What a fabulous and memorable week this was! Have a blessed Lent!

how to calculate slope given two ordered pairs, and how to graph inequalities. We had a test on chapter 9 on Friday.


In 7th grade language arts, we continued our grammar unit on punctuation. We started reading The Hiding
