

We are well into the third quarter and starting to look toward the 2011 - 2012

school year (I feel so old when I say the years). This means it is time to register for the coming school year. To all our parents who we realize are the primary educators of their children, I want to thank you for allowing us to provide this opportunity to assist you with your child's education. With your ongoing support of Angelus Academy, I am confident that we will continue to provide an excellent faith-based academic environment for the students.

The Angelus Academy board has made efforts to limit any increases in tuition knowing that our families already make sacrifices to attend our school. The tuition increase for the 2011 - 2012 school year will be \$250 across the board. There will be no increase for books and supplies or field trips.

At this time we are sending out the fee schedule, one application (additional forms can be downloaded from the website) and the tuition preference form. We will send home emergency, field trip and other forms with the final report cards in June. All forms will be available on the Angelus Academy website (angelusacademy.com). Downloading forms helps to save on the cost of printing and the amount of paper we use every year.

Please return the registration fee of \$200 per student and the application by April 11th.

The letter "Q" and the combination "qu" were introduced this week in phonics. "Q" was also the letter of the week in handwriting. We learned to play the card game "War" in math to help us learn to compare and order numbers. We also worked with a new math material, tangrams, as well as continuing to work with simple addition and subtraction problems.

<u>The Little Seed</u> by Eric Carle was read and discussed in science. In Language we read and discussed The Napping House by Audrey and Don Wood. In religion we continue reading and discussing the life of St.

Happy Spring!! What a beautiful time of year as we

see all the signs of new life! We had another fabulous week in first grade. We read <u>Brer Rabbit</u> and <u>The Tale of Peter Rabbit</u> from our Core Knowledge collection. We compared and contrasted the two rabbits using a Venn Diagram. We also read more stories by Beatrix Potter including <u>The Tale of Benjamin Bunny</u> and <u>The Tale of Squirrel Nutkin</u>. We talked about things we see, hear, taste, and smell in the spring and the children wrote poems about it.

In math, we learned strategies for adding 3 singledigit numbers. The children noticed they can add the numbers in any order and get the same answer.

In religion we continue to focus on Lent. We talked about Mary and how she is a mother to all of us. We discussed the many reasons she is a beautiful example to all of us.

We continue to explore the three states of matter in science. We observed how some solids can change to liquids and liquids to solid. We also saw how mixing some solids and liquids creates a gas. If you push a paper towel into the bottom of a cup and then push the cup straight down into a pitcher of water, do you think the paper towel will stay dry? Can raisins "dance." Ask your child the answers to these questions. We enjoyed making ice-cream, play-dough, and oobleck. And what would all this be without a visit from Mrs. Frizzle?? Enjoy your week-end.

We are seeing some incredible growth in our plants this week. We noticed

that they always turn toward the sun for their needs. We also noticed that if we don't care for them, they wilt. We turned that thought into our prayer lives. We took a test on our history of immigration and citizenship. We are now turning our attention to other countries. Since there are many things happening in

Fourth quarter is off to a good start. We are covering

our science unit on the human body by starting our look at the muscular system. We are learning about voluntary and involuntary muscles, as well as how muscles work in pairs. In history, I have expanded our unit on the Spanish Explorers to look at the missions along the California coast which were founded by Blessed Junipero Serra. We also have talked about all of the cities in our country that started off as missions: St. Augustine, San Antonio TX, San Francisco, San Diego, Los Angeles, Sacramento, and had the students recognize the Catholic names of those cities. We are also enjoying the story of Misty of Chincoteague.

We are working hard on Adopt-a-Country. In religion we are learning about the Communion of Saints: the Church Militant, the Church Suffering and the Church Triumphant. We enjoyed a creative writing opportunity based on a Canadian folktale about preserving friendships and the importance of community. The students also wrote mad libs to practice recognizing parts of speech especially adjectives.

This week in prealgebra, we learned about using symmetry to find

area, finding the volumes of prisms, cylinders, pyramids, and cones, and finding the surface areas of prisms and cylinders.

In 7th grade language arts, we learned about the runon sentence and how to combine sentences. We continued reading <u>The Hiding Place</u>. We are also working on a short play about the life of John Paul II to be performed on May 2.

In 6th grade science, we learned about wind energy and worked on finishing up our unit on types of energy.

In 7th grade science, we took a test on mitosis, meiosis, cell structure, DNA synthesis, transcription, and translation. We also started a new chapter on inheritance in humans and human genetic disorders.

In 8th grade science, we learned about sound quality, the applications of sound, and how you hear.

Social Studies: We completed our Chapter 22 on Civil Rights with each

student preparing and presenting a biography on a noted person from that movement. Students also successfully completed an 'open book' final on that Chapter. We have now moved into Chapter 23 and the Vietnam Era.

Modern Languages and Cultures: We have completed our studies on names of days, months, and seasons in Spanish. In our monthly trip around the world, we made a special visit to Ireland to learn about St Patrick, Irish history and folklore. We have also learned a few words in Gaelic, and, last but not least, the words and movements to the "Unicorn Song" by the Irish Rovers!
